

## HISTORY OF EAST HIGH SCHOOL

East High, the third high school of Columbus, was established in the year 1896 and was located temporarily at Ohio Avenue School.

The school enrollment increased until it was necessary to take some classes to Felton Avenue School. In 1899, East moved into a new building on Franklin Avenue. However, this building, in time, was not large enough for the enrollment, and, in the fall of 1923, the students and faculty of East moved into the present building at Broad and Parkwood Avenues.

#### EAST HIGH DISTRICT BOUNDARIES

Beginning at the intersection of Washington and Livingston Avenues, north to Buckingham, west to Cleveland Avenue, north to C. A. & C. tracks, east and north to Fifth Avenue and the corporation line, west to Washington Avenue and the place of beginning.

#### FACTS ABOUT THE BUILDING

The site was purchased in 1914.

The area of the site is 2.69 acres.

The total cubic capacity is 2,400,000 cubic feet.

The total length of the corridors is 1890 feet.

The library will accommodate 7000 volumes.

The auditorium seats 1080 persons.

There are eight entrances.

There are six stairways.

The building is 375½ feet in length facing Broad Street, and 127 feet in width. It is bounded on the east by Parkwood Avenue, on the north by Eastwood Avenue, and on the west by Taylor Avenue.

Room numbers begin at the northwest end of the building. Room numbers under one hundred are on the ground floor, those from one to two hundred are on the first floor, and those above two hundred are on the second floor.

## BOARD OF EDUCATION RULES

165. Principals are expected to prohibit the use of tobacco, chewing gum, or their substitutes in or about the school. They may suspend a pupil for the infraction of this rule.

201. The rate of tuition for a high school pupil whose home is outside the Columbus school district is sixty-five dollars

a semester.

206. Sickness of the pupil, severe indisposition in the family, unavoidable detention, or some pressing emergency shall be considered as the only legitimate excuses for absence. Any pupil who shall leave the school at any time previous to the regular time for closing, or without satisfactory excuse shall absent himself from any exhibition of the school, or any recitation, or who returns home to avoid being marked tardy, may be temporarily suspended by the principal and by him reported in writing to the superintendent or assistant superintendents of schools.

This ruling applies to lunch and study

periods, as well as classes.

#### ABSENCE

Students who are excused during the day must be excused officially by the principal,

vice-principal, or clerk.

A student who is absent from a class room or from any other part of the building, unless officially excused before the absence occurs, will be considered a truant.

One who finds it necessary because of illness to be excused must be excused at

the office. When he returns to school, he must bring a written excuse signed by his parent or guardian. This excuse must carry the date and registration room number of the pupil.

The student whose parents request him to leave school during the day shall bring a note from home before being excused. This note must state the reason for the

request.

If a student has been absent from school for any reason, he shall, before re-entering his classes, present to the office, then to his teachers and to his registration room teacher a note signed by a parent or guardian stating the cause of his absence. This note must carry the date and the registration room number of the pupil.

REGULAR ATTENDANCE IS ESSENTIAL FOR SATISFACTORY WORK

#### TARDINESS

A student who comes to school less than two hours late is considered late, not absent. Before going to class, the tardy pupil must go to the office for an admission slip to the class where he is due.

Detention is the usual punishment for tardiness. A note from the parent or guardian stating a legitimate excuse for the tardiness may exempt the pupil from this punishment.

#### BANKING

Each Wednesday, East students may deposit money in the School Savings Department of the Ohio National Bank. Banking is done in registration rooms.

## GOING HOME FOR LUNCH

A pupil who lives close to the school may go home for lunch, providing he can walk home and back within the half hour allotted. Such a pupil must present at the office a written request signed by his parent or guardian asking that he be allowed to come home to lunch.

#### WITHDRAWALS

The law requires that a child go to school until he is eighteen years of age. After he is sixteen, if he is regularly employed, he may attend a part-time school, maintained at the School Administration Building, on East State Street. He may not withdraw from school when he is sixteen, unless he has secured permanent employment and has been given a working permit by the Attendance Department at the Administration Building.

A pupil who is eighteen years old, may withdraw from school by notifying the office.

A pupil moving out of town should notify the office and receive his grade card which he takes with him. His credits are later mailed to his new school.

#### CAFETERIA

Remember these rules when you eat in the cafeteria:

Do not make an unnecessary amount of noise.

Never sit on or lean against the tables.

Each pupil must return his own tray to the disposal table, and stack his own dishes.

After food has passed the cash register,

it cannot be returned or exchanged.

Be sure that you have the correct change. Mistakes will not be rectified after you have passed the cashier.

Food, including candy, should be eaten

only in the cafeteria.

Boys will form in the line to the left; girls, in the line to the right. Stay in place in the line.

Allow teachers to pass before you in the line.

#### BOOK EXCHANGE

The Book Exchange, operated and managed by students, is one of the conveniences offered to the students at East. Here books are bought from and sold to the pupils. Any profits derived are used for the good of the school. The Book Exchange is located on the ground floor at the west end of the building. Mrs. Rutherford is the faculty adviser.

#### LOST AND FOUND

A pupil who loses anything is urged to

report at once to the office.

A pupil who finds anything should take it at once to the office, leaving it with the clerk. If a library book is found, it should be taken to the library.

#### MONITORS

Student Monitors are stationed at various points about the building. Their duty is to keep the halls clear and quiet and to assist visitors.

Any reasonable request from them should

be promptly complied with.

#### LOCKERS

Every pupil must have an approved combination lock. The number of the locker and the combination of the lock must be filed with Mr. Parkinson in Room 104.

It is forbidden to "set" locks.

#### ANNEX STUDIES

To relieve crowded conditions in the regular study rooms, Annex Study Rooms are formed. These are under the direction of students. Only approved pupils may be members. The Annex Study System is a part of the Student Government and is administered by the Student Council.

#### TELEPHONES

Except in cases of emergency, pupils are not permitted to use the office phone. Only important messages will be delivered to pupils.

A pay telephone is located in the office

for the use of pupils.

#### AUDITORIUM PROGRAMS

Show your appreciation of visiting speakers and guests by your polite attention during all auditorium programs.

LIBRARY

The library is open from 9:30 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. Students may use the library during their lunch periods. As a rule, pupils come to the library during their study periods. The library permit system is used. Each person signs his name on the blank in the study room or annex and goes to the library. This is done within the first five minutes of the period. Anyone coming from other than a study room must have a note from the teacher who wishes him to use the library at that period.

Quiet and good order are expected from

all students who use the library.

#### CIRCULATION OF BOOKS

No books are taken from the library until they are charged to the student at the charging desk.

There are two kinds of circulation:

1. Books which may be used for two weeks. (A fine of two cents a day is charged for books kept over that time.)

2. Overnight books. (These books are issued at the close of the school day and are returned by 8:45 of the next day. A fine of five cents per day is charged for these books if they are kept out over time.)

Students are not to leave the library for a study room or elsewhere without per-

mission from the librarian.

When using the library for an assignment, consult the catalogue first. Do what you can without help, but do not hesitate to consult the librarian or her assistant. Do not leave the library until you have found what

you want, unless you are told by the librarian that it is unavailable.

The library is not used for text book

study.

Each reader can help the library to give good service by observing the rules which were made for the general good, by returning books promptly so that others may use them, by never taking books or other printed matter from the room without having a record made, and by putting away books if sure where they belong. Such co-operation saves the time of the library workers so that they have more time to help students in need of assistance.

### GENERAL TRAFFIC RULES

All east entrances are for girls; all west entrances are for boys.

Keep to the right when moving through

the halls.

Walk quickly, but do not run to classes. No traffic through the gyms, gym stairs, or auditorium.

Pupils are asked not to go to their lockers during class periods. The noise and confusion that result are disturbing to classes in nearby rooms.

Refrain from marking the walls and desks of your building. It is considered the most

beautiful school building in the city.

If, when you are in the halls, a teacher makes a request of you, do not stop to argue but obey promptly. Every teacher in the building must receive prompt obedience.

Whistling, shouting and singing in the

halls are positively forbidden.

### HONOR SOCIETY

Pupils may be admitted to the East High Honor Society on the following conditions:

Scholarship. The score of points for each senior is computed during the semester previous to his graduation. The grades count as follows:

A-3 B-2 C-1

The score is computed on a basis of twenty grades, each representing one-half unit of work done. If the pupil has more than twenty grades, only the highest twenty are counted. Only grades made at East are counted. Thus the perfect score would be sixty points. For membership in the Honor Society a pupil must have a score of ninety per cent, or fifty-four points. To attain this, the fewest number of A's which a student may have is fourteen.

In case a pupil has entered from the junior high school with five or six units of work, he may graduate from East with as few as sixteen grades from that school. In that case, the grades exclusive of his last semester are considered, and he may be admitted if he has made ninety per cent of three times the number of grades upon

which his score is computed.

Character. The list of students whose scholarship is high enough for admission, is submitted to the teachers to be voted upon. Any pupil may be eliminated because of character or of conduct.

1927-1928 SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS

The classes of 1927 and 1928 left as their memorial a fund, the annual interest of which is used to buy two books. One is presented to the boy, the other, to the girl in the Academic course with the highest scholastic record.

#### KURTZ TABLET

This award, given by Charles Jewett Kurtz in 1931, is presented yearly to the senior who has shown exceptional ability in English. These pupils have won the honor:

1931. Edward Gullivan.

1932. Richard Tully. 1933. Edward Sittler.

#### ROTARY LUNCHEON

The Rotary Luncheon is given annually by the members of the Rotary Club for some selected seniors from the Columbus High Schools. At East, the representatives are selected by the teachers on a basis of citizenship, character, and personality.

Each year two members of these schools are asked to address the guests at the luncheon. The following East students have

spoken:

1926. Maxine Cohen.1928. William West.1930. Robert Ebinger.1933. Robert McKee.

The purpose of the Oratorical Contest is to acquaint the high school student with the Constitution, and to foster honor and respect for it. In Columbus, the contest is sponsored by the Board of Education, which awards a prize of fifty dollars to the school winning the championship. This money is used to purchase a picture of some American statesman. Each of the five senior

high schools is represented. These East students have been successful:

- 1927. William Lewis-Picture of George Washington.
- 1933. William Purdue—Picture of Abraham Lincoln.

#### STUDENT COUNCIL

The Student Council is composed of these members: The president of the 12A class, who is the president of the council, and one representative for each one hundred members of each of the classes. See constitution.

#### HANDBOOK

The East High Handbook, the project of the 1934 Student Council, is a complete index and guide to all East activities.

All new students should buy the Hand-

book.

#### FIRE DRILLS

At the sound of the fire gong, students should walk quietly and quickly to the nearest exit. DO NOT RUN. The last person to leave the room should shut the windows and doors.

To avoid congestion about the exits, go immediately to the street sidewalk. Every person in the building must participate in the drill.

#### COMMENCEMENT

Commencement exercises are held in June and mid-year, taking place at the Coliseum and Memorial Hall. A distinguished speaker makes the address. The superintendent of schools presents the class to the President of the Board of Education who awards the graduates their diplomas.

#### SENIOR PLAY

The Senior Play is a well established institution at East. We have always led the way in the cultivation of the dramatic arts and were the first school in Columbus to present a Shakespearean drama to the public.

The Senior Play is produced entirely by seniors and is a project of the Dramatics

Department.

#### CLASS NIGHT

Class Night is the last occasion on which the seniors are together as a class at East. The class in a procession moves to the stage of the auditorium, where a program of speeches and music is given. All seniors must attend.

#### CLASS VESPERS

On the Sunday afternoon before Commencement, the senior class takes part in a Vespers service. A speaker is invited to address the class, and a program of sacred and patriotic music is given.

#### CLASS BREAKFAST

The class breakfast is the annual senior party. It is given exclusively for the seniors and is usually held on the Friday morning before commencement.

# ORGANIZATIONS SECRET SOCIETIES

Prospective pupils of East should know that, in accordance with the law of the State of Ohio which forbids the existence of fraternities and sororities in high schools, all secret groups of this type are not approved at East.

#### GIRL RESERVES

The Girl Reserves, a junior branch of the Y. W. C. A., is a social service organization. Meetings are held once a month. Among the activities sponsored are skating parties, dances, Easter Services, an annual Christmas party, and the collection and delivery of Thanksgiving baskets for needy families.

#### BLUE TRIANGLE

The Blue Triangle Y. W. C. A. club's slogan is "To Find and Give the Best"; its motto "Face Life Squarely". The triangle, with its three sides represents body,

mind, and spirit.

The object of the club is shown by its name, "The High School Friendship Club". In it, every girl is the friend of every other girl and learns to "Play Square". Meetings are held every Friday; one week for play; one, for music; one, for literature; and one, for business.

### Spring Street Hi-Y

This club is open to all boys. Aside from athletics, it sponsors character building, moral training, clean sportsmanship, and religious education.

At present the club holds the class B championship cup for basketball and was runner-up in baseball in 1933.

#### H<sub>I</sub>-Y

East Hi-Y is an organization which meets at the central Y. M. C. A. It sponsors a three-fold program of educational work, social events, and athletics. Each year representatives from all Hi-Y organizations conduct the business of the city for one day. The East High chapter competes with the other schools in baseball, basketball, swimming, and bowling.

The club's purpose is to promote clean living, clean speech, clean scholarship, and

clean athletics.

#### X-RAY

The East High X-Ray, formerly known as the X-Rays, has served the students and faculty of East for more than thirty-five years. From 1898 to 1917 it appeared in magazine form; from 1917 to 1933, as a newspaper. In September 1933, it was proposed to Mr. Skimming that the X-Ray be returned to its original form, and his approval was given.

More than eight hundred dollars is expended for the publication of each volume. This sum is raised by subscription and the sale of advertising space. Subscriptions are taken in registration rooms, advertising is

sold by members of the staff.

As a record of student activities, the X-Ray is invaluable to the students and alumni of East. It sponsors athletics, music, dramatics, and all worth-while activities.

#### BAND

The band was organized in 1929. Since that time it has played for football and basketball games.

The uniform consists of orange and black caps, black sweaters, black trousers, black capes lined with orange, and black shoes.

One-eighth music credit per semester is given band members who attend practice regularly and are present at public appearances of the band.

#### ORCHESTRA

The East High Orchestra plays for the class play, the graduation exercises, and many other occasions. Any pupil who plays an orchestral instrument is eligible for membership. Music credit is given to orchestra members.

#### GAMUT CLUB

The Gamut Club is a musical organization which meets every Friday during the fifth and sixth periods. Its purpose is to create an interest in classical music, to give the members the experience of performing before an audience, to encourage polite attention on the part of the audience, and to stimulate interest in class work.

### MUSICAL ART SOCIETY

The Musical Art Society is a club devoted to the study of good music and meets three times a week in the music room.

#### GLEE CLUB

The Glee Club, which meets three times a week in the music room, is open to all girls.

#### ELECTIVES

#### ART DEPARTMENT

The average person does not plan to make art his profession, but he will find that the art course gives him a fine discrimination and appreciation, stimulates his creative ability, and cultivates his good taste. The knowledge of art principles is required in many branches of industry. The development of the power to create a pleasing environment and to associate art with everyday life makes possible a fuller and more complete existence.

#### FOODS AND CLOTHING

Every girl should have some experience in the study of foods and clothing. Meal preparation, considered from the standpoint of health and of thrift, is learned in the Foods Department. Special emphasis is placed on the study of the nutritive value of foods, and their uses to the body.

In clothing, the girls acquire knowledge, not only in constructing garments, but also in selecting their wardrobes with taste, in adapting current fashions to their own particular type, and in remodeling clothes.

A study of child development is offered in the second semester of each year and is open to any junior or senior girl. This course deals with the care and training of children, the importance of correct habit formation, health, food, and the actual construction of a child's garment.

### Apartment

The Household Arts Apartment adjoins the Foods room and is under the supervision of the Household Arts classes. Pupils in the clothing classes made the curtains and drapes, table runners, chair covers, pillows and bed spreads used in the Apartment and upholstered the furniture in the teachers' rest room on the first floor.

The entire Apartment is used as a model home in which the pupils put into practice the ideas learned in class. The bedroom is used as a hospital in case of emergency.

Several teas and parties for special occasions, as well as classes in home nursing are held in the apartment.

## Manual Arts Shop

In the Manual Arts shops the student learns to use his hands by making things. Some students are interested in shop work for its trade training, some for its engineering development, and some for the development of a hobby. In the shops at East, each pupil is given an opportunity to study material and processes in the making of some project along his own designs and Since all grades of pupils are in each class, the students are put upon their own to work out their projects. It is suggested to each person to choose a job which will challenge his ability. Students make all manner of things from engines, boats, machines, and furniture, to fine tools, trays, motors, and useful things of all descriptions.

## Practice Stage in Dramatics Room

The theatre in the dramatics room was built by boys from the Manual Arts Department. The electric wiring, ceiling border lights, curtain machinery, and the battons on the ceiling were all made by them.

The boys who worked on the stage project were chosen because of their capability and willingness to volunteer their services.

## Mechanical Drawing

Every invidividual at some time finds the need of interpreting the ideas of others or of expressing his own ideas in the form of a blueprint, a graph, or a map.

The beginning course in drawing gives the student a survey of the entire field of drawing and equips him with the simple skill required in the graphic representation of ideas.

After the student has completed the beginning course, he may choose any one of the following courses in drawing: Architectural, Commercial, Machine, Landscape, Project Design, and Topographical. These courses give the student more intensive training in the development of skill and knowledge of subject-matter in a particular field of drawing activity.

All courses are conducted on the individual instruction and supervised-study plan. Each pupil is allowed to progress at his own speed and is given credit for the course when it is completed.

## Foreign Language

The study of a foreign language is highly profitable to the student. The "grandeur that was Rome" can best be pictured in the pursuit of Latin, while German and the Romance languages, French and Spanish give a knowledge of the modern foreign classics. Here only can we make the acquaintance of those varied personalities, "Le Medecin Malgré Lui", "Wilhelm Tell", and "José."

Language is an aid to the study of English, broadens one's viewpoint of all literature, and increases culture.

## Boys' Physical Education

Physical Education is required of all boys in the tenth and eleventh grades. Boys who are members of the squads in competitive athletics are excused from the gym classes for the duration of the training season, if they present a note from the coach of that sport. At the end of the training season, the boy must enroll in the gym class and remain there for the rest of the semester. The following sports are recognized as substitutes for gym work: football, basketball, baseball, track, cross country, golf and tennis. Regulation gym suits are required. An exhibition of the work done in the gym is given each year and counts as an examination. It is required that all pupils take part in it.

## GIRLS' PHYSICAL EDUCATION

### REQUIRED WORK

Three periods of work a week are required for two years. They consist of formal work, games and dancing. A demonstration is held annually, and all girls are required to take part.

Girls who, because of physical defects are excused by a physician, are required to take two periods of Hygiene a week for two

years.

The regulation gym costume consists of a one-piece blue suit, white socks and tennis shoes.

The lockers in the locker room are equipped with combination locks, and the fee of ten cents a semester is charged for their rental.

#### VOLUNTARY WORK

Girls of the Coulmbus High Schools are not permitted to compete in interscholastic sports. Intramurals and class games take their place and are based on a similar point system. Intramurals are held during the ninth period and after school. From the points earned a Girls' Atheletic Association is organized. Seventy-five points are necessary for membership. One hundred and fifty points win a letter. Newcomb, basketball, volleyball, and kcikball are the games played in intramurals.

Sportsmanship is stressed in all intramurals.

Pupils who expect to enter an eastern college are urged to inform the principal as soon as they enter East.

#### REQUIREMENTS OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY

SUMMARY OF ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS UNDERGRADUATES

An applicant for admission to any college in the Ohio State University must be a graduate of a high school of the first grade or of an accredited secondary school, or must pass entrance examinations in high school subjects amounting to fifteen units.

Fifteen units in high school work of acceptable subjects must be offered by every applicant. No fraction of a unit less than one-half will be recognized.

COLLEGE OF LAW AND MEDICINE Two years' work in the College of Arts is required before the student may enter the College of Law or the College of Medicine.

# REPORT CARDS

Report cards are issued to the pupils three times a semester. They are to be shown to their parents, and then returned to the registration teacher with the parent's signature.

Satisfactory grades are A, B, C. The grade of D indicates danger of failure, while E denotes failing work.

# PERMANENT RECORD CARDS

All final grades are recorded on the pupil's permanent record card, which is kept at the office. Any information concerning the pupil's scholastic standing is derived from this card.

#### ATHLETICS

ATHLETIC ELIGIBILITY RULES

Any pupil may take part in athletic contests whose name appears on the list approved by the principal of the school and the Ohio Athletic Association. However, no student is eligible to compete:

1. Who is not an undergraduate.

 Who has taken part in any interscholastic sport for more than six semesters.

3. Who is not maintaining a passing grade in at least three major subjects. If a senior does not need three subjects for graduation, he need carry only the necessary subjects.

FOOTBALL

East has turned out three all-American football players. They are Ray Eichenlaub, John Thurman and Chic Harley. This is an accomplishment that few colleges can claim. Each year we play each team in the city league once and play several out-of-town games.

East won an undisputed championship in 1932, and in 1933, we were co-champions

with West.,

BASKETBALL

East High Basketball teams have frequently walked off with championships. Since 1924, we have won the district championship twice, have been runners-up twice, and have been runners-up for the State championship once. In 1933 and in 1934 we were co-champions with Central. Johnny Miner, the nationally known player, is an East graduate.

Each year, two games are played with each team in the City High School League.

BASEBALL

Every spring sees many embryo big leaguers turn out for baseball practice. Although East has not many diamond championships, we always give the best of teams a run for their money.

TRACK

East has had an unusually brilliant track record, having produced several world's record holders. Among these is George Simpson, the fastest human. While at East, he tied the world's interscholastic record for the hundred yard dash. Another star is Jack Keller, the holder of the world's interscholastic high and low hurdle records. Simpson, while at Ohio State, set the world's record of 9.4 seconds for the hundred yard dash. Keller, while at Ohio State, set a new world's record for the high hurdles. Both Simpson and Keller were on the 1932 Olympic Team and represented the United States at Los Angeles.

The Sprint Relay team, composed of George and Bill Simpson, Charles Armstrong, and Tom Fallon set a new world's interscholastic record in the 440 and 880 yard relay. Chick Medberry won the state cross country run of two and a half miles

in 1928 and set a state record.

In 1926, the East track team was runnerup in the National Interscholastic Track and Field Meet in Chicago.

GYMNASTICS

With one exception, East has been first

or second in every city gym meet. With the exception of one year since the State Gym meet has been held, a member of East's team has won the Indian Club swinging championship. Paul Kramer, Don Mc-Cullough and Bob John are the three champions. The gym team meets for practice the eighth and ninth periods, Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

GOLF

East is in the Greater Columbus Golf League. This sport has been well organized. Tournament play is held every Saturday morning, beginning in April and ending in the middle of June. Tournaments are held on different courses. An arrangement has been made to give the boys free practice at the Army Golf Course.

SWIMMING

Swimming is a good sport at East. The team is always at the top of the league and has won the championship several times. Several world record holders have been members of East's swimming teams.

#### TENNIS

East has had some great tennis teams and tennis players, who have won city championships many times. Several players from these teams have later become intercollegiate stars. In 1933, Charles Steinman won the district singles championship.

ATHLETIC LETTERS

Athletic letters are awarded on the merit basis by the coaches of each sport.

EAST TROPHIES

In the center of the main hall are the

trophy cases which contain the prizes won by East in many branches of sports. There are state and city championship trophies and some awards which have been taken in athletic events in other states.

HARLEY TROPHY

This cup was presented to the school by the class of 1925 as a memorial to Chic Harley. On it is inscribed each year the name of an outstanding athlete who has a score of at least forty points in academic subjects. For the methods of computing the score, see Honor Society.

NATIONAL RECOGNITION CUP

This cup was presented to the school by the Athletic Department in 1929, to honor boys who have received national recognition in athletics. In 1929, the name of Jack Keller was engraved on the cup.

LITTLE BROWN JUG

A popular tradition is the winning of the little brown jug. This is a trophy which the winning team in the annual North-East football contest receives. The jug is kept by the winning school one year. The score for each game played is kept inside the jug. Won by East in 1929, 1932 and 1933, the jug is now in the possession of East.

AGONIS PLAQUE

This award is presented yearly by the Agonis Club to the best student athlete at East for that year. The winner must be a boy prominent in athletics, with satisfactory scholarship. The plaque has been awarded to

# HARLEY FIELD

East's athletic field is named after the greatest athlete ever enrolled at East. Our famous "Chic" was Ohio State's first All-American player and is still considered the finest player ever produced at that school.

Harley Field has a football field, a full quarter-mile track, and two baseball diamonds, which are entirely separate from the football and track fields. Between the baseball diamonds there is room for a practice football field, so that the regular field can be used for games only.

The field is located about a mile northeast of the building. To reach it, go north on Parkwood or Taylor Avenues to Greenway Avenue, which is a continuation of Mount Vernon Avenue. Turn east on Greenway under the railway bridge. On the

left is Harley Field.

#### WRESTLING

Wrestling was established at East three years ago. In these three years, we have won championships in 1933 and in 1934.

# CHEER LEADERS

East Cheer Leaders are chosen at the beginning of each semester by the Director of Athletics. Their uniforms consist of black sweaters with white trousers. They must lead the cheering at all football and basketball games to receive their letters.

# STUDENT GOVERNMENT CONSTI-TUTION

#### PREAMBLE

The students of East High School, in order to secure an efficient student government, establish this constitution.

# ARTICLE I SECTION 1—Membership (Legislative and Executive)

The legislative and executive body shall be the Student Council, and shall consist of representatives apportioned to classes in the following manner: Each grade shall have one representative for each hundred. If the number above the hundred mark exceeds fifty, another representative shall be allowed that grade.

Each grade shall have at least one rep-

resentative.

The Student Council Adviser shall be an

ex-officio member of the Council.

The president of the senior class shall be the president of the Council during his 12A semester. In his absence, a president protem., (a senior) selected by the Council shall preside.

Section 2—Eligibility

Any member of the Council receiving more than one D in a major subject, or one E in one Major subject on any report card shall become ineligible. Exceptions to this rule may be made in special cases at the discretion of the Student Council.

# SECTION 3-Term

The representatives shall hold office during the semester in which they are elected.

# Section 4-Vacancies

Any vacancy in the Student Council shall be filled by an alternate to be chosen by the representatives of the grade in which the vacancy occurs. This alternate shall be approved by the Council.

A vacancy in a class with one representative shall be filled by appointment by the

Council as a whole.

# Section 5-Powers

The Student Council shall have power:

(a) To enact any legislation necessary to establish and maintain effective student government, and to enforce such legislation.

(b) To dismiss any member of the Council for ineligibility or unbecoming conduct. Such dismissals shall require a two-thirds vote of the Council.

ARTICLE II SECTION 1—Membership
(Judicial)

The judicial body shall be called The Student Court and shall consist of five justices to be appointed by the Council, upon the recommendation of a nominating committee appointed by the president of the Council, not later than one week after elections.

Section 2

One clerk and one bailiff shall be appointed by the court at its first meeting.

SECTION 3-Rules

The Student court shall appoint a committee to draft a code of laws and penalties which shall guide and limit the court in all cases brought before it.

Section 4-Vacancies

Vacancies shall be filled by appointment by the Council.

SECTION 5—Eligibility

Any member of the Student Court who receives more than one D in more than one major subject, or one E in one major subject on any report card shall become ineligible. Exceptions to this rule may be made in special cases at the discretion of the Student Council.

#### Section 5—Powers

The Student Court shall have the power:

(a) To summon any student upon the recommendation of the principals, Student Council, or upon its own initiative, for investigation, discipline or as a witness.

(b) To impose penalties on any student found guilty of violation of the laws of the Student Council or of conduct unbecoming to a student of East High School.

# ARTICLE III—Amendments

Any article of this constitution may be amended as follows:

- (a) Amendments may be proposed at any Council meeting by a member of Council or by a petition signed by twenty-five students.
- (b) The proposed amendment shall not be voted upon before the next meeting of Council and shall require a three-fourths majority.

ARTICLE IV-By-Laws

By-Laws may be proposed by any member of the Council and adopted by a three-fourths majority of the Council.

By-Law I-Nominations and Elections

All nominations shall be by petition signed by twenty-five members of the pupils enrolled in that grade. Fall elections shall be held the third Thursday after the beginning of school. Winter elections shall be held the second Thursday after the beginning of the second semester.

Senior officers, president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer shall be elected during their 12B semesters for the entire year.

The Student Government Adviser shall be selected annually in the fall by the Principal and Vice-Principal.

By-Law II-Meetings

Meetings of the Council shall be held at least once a week, the date to be fixed at the first annual meeting. This meeting shall be called by the Student Government Adviser not later than the first week after election.

The Student Court shall meet at least three times a week, the dates to be fixed at the first meeting. This meeting shall be called by the Adviser not later than the first week after the appointment of the judges.

A quorum to do business in the Council shall consist of three-fourths of the members.

A quorum to do business in the Court shall consist of three justices.

The president of the Senior Class and presiding officer of the Council shall

(a) Call special meetings of the Council.

(b) Appoint all committees.

The clerk and bailiff of the Student Court shall attend to all duties assigned to them by the Court.

# By-LAW III

A secretary shall be elected by the Council from the Council at the first meeting.

#### AMENDMENTS

Article I, Section 3, shall be amended to read as follows:

Representatives shall hold office during the entire year in which they are elected.
